## SWEDISH MONARCHY FROM THE 18TH TO THE 20TH CENTURY

## MY HELLSING

Uppsala University

Why do court studies often appear marginal to modern political history? This is all the more surprising given the polemic quests for modernity, nationalistic sentiments and historical memory that are deeply embedded in European monarchies. This presentation takes Hellsing's on-going research as a starting point for a wider discussion on court studies and Swedish self-perception, suggesting how insights from studies on the eighteenth century might contribute to our understanding of the more recent past.

**My Hellsing** defended her thesis on women's political agency at the late eighteenth century Swedish court in 2013. She is currently a researcher at Uppsala University, preparing a monograph on political sociability in Stockholm, ca. 1770–1860. She is also the editor-in-chief of *Sjuttonhundratal* (the Nordic version of the ÖGE18 Yearbook).
